Upcoming Chapter Event:

AWG-PNW's 2023 Field Trips:

Marcia is exploring a follow-up field trip to our SE BC trip to NW Washington to look at the similar rocks on our side of the border, probably in spring of 2023. This would be a 3- to 4-day trip including Republic (with a trip to Stonerose plant fossil quarry), Kettle Falls (located on the edge of the late Precambrian rifted North American craton) and Metaline Falls to look at lower Paleozoic shelf rocks. We may also go into northern Idaho to look at Purcell/Belt rocks. Everyone will be responsible for their own transportation, lodging, and food. However, carpooling will be encouraged/facilitated. Participants will


